The Town Times contains important information about the services available to our residents as well as information on leisure and recreational opportunities taking place throughout the year. As Council enters its final year of its four year term, we have some very exciting accomplishments to be proud of. The Library and the Civic Centre continue to be the central location for many community recreational, social, and cultural activities. In 2013 we saw the installation of the first ever Book Tree in Canada. We also celebrated the grand openings of our new Bike Park and Splash Pad. The Town's Economic Development Department conducted a successful "I Love Petawawa" campaign and Visitor Information Centre (VIC) pilot project. The VIC received a score of 98% through the Ontario Highlands Tourism Organization mystery shop program.

and sewer rates, which are strictly user-pay, are also some of the lowest around. Council budgeted \$3.6 million for infrastructure projects in 2013. Some of these projects included: Victoria Street Phase 2 reconstruction, Herman Street Phase 2 reconstruction, Plum Tree Lane rehabilitation, and various sidewalk construction projects as well as design work for future road construction projects. Council extends our collective appreciation for the patience and understanding of those residents most significantly affected by the inconveniences of these construction projects. Council supported a great variety of initia-

tives in terms of both residential and commercial development in 2013 including the issuance of 314 building permits with a value of over \$25 million; total property assessment now exceeds \$1.4 billion. In 2014 we anticipate the completion of several commercial developments including the Northern Credit Union, Rona Hardware, Pizza Hut, Dairy Queen, and a large automotive and service delivery facility. Regarding residential development, construction continues within four active subdivisions and the Town anticipates the development of two 18 unit condominium buildings and one 30 unit apartment building to be known as "The Residences of Riverstone" at the corner of Civic Centre Road and Highland Park Drive.

As the 4th Canadian Division Support Group (4 CDSG) Commander and Commander of 4th Canadian Division Support Base Petawawa (4 CDSB) Petawawa, I am very proud of the relationship the community and Garrison Petawawa have established over the years.

Town of Petawawa Burning By-law

With the warm weather approaching at some point in time this year, the following regulations shall be followed in regards to any burning within the Town of Petawawa. Town residents must keep in mind that burning any time of year is prohibited in certain areas of the Town of Petawawa regardless of Recreational or Open Air Burning. Zero tolerance will be enforced for those who burn without a permit. Charges will be laid.

OPEN AIR BURNING – No persons shall set a fire or allow a fire to burn within the boundaries of the Town of Petawawa without first having obtained a permit from the Municipality or the Chief Fire Official. Open air burning is not allowed from June 1 to September 30 inclusive.

RECREATIONAL FIRES – Requires approval by the Chief Fire Official or designate. Site visits will be conducted and smoke alarms will be tested to ensure that they are functional prior to the issuing of the permit.

Open Air Burning and Recreational Burning Permit Applications, as well as a copy of By-law 294/04, can either be obtained at The Town of Petawawa Office located at 1111 Victoria Street or on the Town Website (www.petawawa.ca) under Protective Services. This will be my last contribution to the Petawawa Town Times as I am scheduled to retire at the end of June after 35 years in the municipal administration business. Over that time I have made some observations and formed opinions which may be of interest and I would like to share them with you.

The CAO walks a fine line between the staff and Council. As the senior administrator in the municipality, you have ultimate responsibility for all staff functions. You deal with hiring, performance reviews, human resources matters and the like, while trying to make a productive team work environment. At the same time, you are responsible to Council for providing advice and guidance, policy directions and initiatives, and technical, legal and financial input. It is a real balancing act and at times things are coming from all directions.

I am very proud of the employees of the Town and the work that they do. I have been around long enough that I have had a hand in the hiring of almost everyone that works at the Town. These people are very dedicated to their work and to serving you and I wish to offer my compliments to them all.

As for elected officials, I have the deepest respect for what they do. Why would you put your name forward to become an elected official? It sure is not for the glory. As an elected official and leader in the community you receive complaints, are often criticized, and there is little positive recognition. These dedicated people are true leaders who volunteer to put up with these working conditions and many long hours for very little in compensation, to work for the good of the community.

I was advised by a wise old politician, when I started this work, to be prepared to deal with a lot of negativity. There will be complaints to deal with, public delegations on controversial projects, legal challenges and human resources issues. Very seldom does the municipality receive a compliment on the services it provides or the work that it is doing on behalf of the constituents. Despite these perceptions it is the occasional act of kindness or thanks for a job well done that means so much

to our employees and keeps them going. Please consider this next time you pick up the phone or come to the counter at the municipal office.

There is always some humour to fall back on. I can recall examples of blunders that were pretty funny. A man, who provided animal control services in the town, once applied for a minor variance to build "log splitters" in his barn. A typo error in the newspaper ad said he wanted to build "dog splitters". Given the nature of his business this was the worst possible mistake. Another time I advertised for a "Small Animal Control Officer" and a gentleman phoned me and asked "How big does he have to be?". We always try to be accurate in our work but Murphy's Law does some time prevail.

The municipal business has changed a lot over my career and the behavior of people in general has changed. Today people seem to have lost respect for government and question its every move. We can see this federally and provincially and by extension it also falls on municipalities. With social media and electronic communications people are more apt

These youth provide our community with many hours and they take great pride in what they accomplish; they are a huge asset for the Village.

We are proud of our strong link with the Regional Tourist Organizations (RTO's), Ottawa Tourist Associa-Vallev tion (OVTA) and Ontario Highland Tourist Organization (OHTO). We have also expanded our partnerships to include Ca-nadian Heritage Ottawa Organization (CHOO/ COPO) as well as Travel Ontario. The advertising and promotion that we receive from these organizations helps us to increase our tourism presence within the Ottawa Valley and Renfrew County.

With the new Incorporation Legislation for Ontario we have had to rewrite our constitution and by-laws as well as design a new organizational chart. Thanks to the many hours that Paul Ballantyne provided, this was completed and presented by him at our AGM meeting in November 2013 when they

were approved.

During 2013 we hosted two new events "WEL-COME TO PETAWAWA" on September 28th 2013 and "Artists in the Park & Children's Art Workshop" in July; both of which were well received by the community. We plan on hosting these again in 2014 and also bring in a new pre-school program. This year we will be launching our 2014-15 Marketing Plan as well as kicking off fund raising for a Pioneer Church, and erecting an expansion to the engine shop and the logging display. The Pembroke and Area Airport was again a hub of activity in 2013. In celebrating its 45th anniversary, the airport hosted Aviation Day with free flights for kids - sponsored by the Airport Commission and with time and aircraft donated by local pilots. 78 children took part in the flights with a waiting list of 25. Many asked if the event could become an annual one, and the Airport plans to offer the same type of event in 2014.

The Airport also hosted one of 12 Women in Aviation events in Ontario. Lesley Page, head of the Women in Aviation organization, attended the event and spoke to a group of women pilots, air cadets and interested people about the experiences of women in a variety of aviation roles.

In addition to the events held at the facility, a good deal of business continues to be happening.

The airport supported nearly 5,000 aircraft movements in 2013, including private flights for business and tourism. The airport continued to be a key location for the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (firefighting, moose tracking and more), the Ontario Provincial Police (drug surveillance) and the Ontario

Ministry of Health (Medevac flights and supporting the Deep River, Pembroke and Barry's Bay hospitals).

The largest user of the Airport is the Canadian Armed Forces and they have increased their time at the facility in 2013. The Airport hosted regular training exercises as well as regular Hercules aircraft flights and some VIP air transport. Parachuting and flight training are common occurrences at the Airport.

Flight training continues to be offered locally and qualifications for military, recreational and commercial licenses are available.

A key question for many people is the opportunity to have scheduled passenger

service return to the Airport. The Airport is currently in discussion with three carriers who are putting together business plans on providing service to Toronto. The Airport is working diligently to help facilitate this service in order to increase the opportunities for local business and pleasure air travel in our region. Having a one-hour connection to Toronto would be helpful to many businesses and individuals locally.

Finally, the Airport is actively working to develop land opportunities which will bring more business to the Town of Petawawa and the Upper Ottawa Valley. Further developments are promoted on Facebook and the Airport's website: www.flycyta.ca.

- 3. At least 18 years old;4. Not legally prohibited from voting; and
- 4. Not legally prohibited from voting; and
- 5. Not disqualified by any legislation from holding municipal office.

In 2013 the Petawawa Centennial Family Health Centre (PCFHC), continued to focus attention on providing the residents of Petawawa with the best possible access to medical care available. We rostered more than 2,300 patients and signed two more doctors for 2014. Dr. Linde Corrigan and Dr. Sonia Fawcett both started their practice at the PCFHC on April 1, 2014. As well, the Walk-in Clinic had over 2,100 visits on Monday and Thursday evenings. In response to patient requests, the PCFHC will be extending its operating hours on Saturday mornings from 9 am - 12 noon. These extended operating hours will further enhance our patient access to Primary Health Care.

The PCFHC would like to remind those families, who may be moving this year, to notify the centre of your departure so they can make space for new families moving into the community. Please help us help you, to receive the best care possible, by keeping us informed of your status.

As part of our ongoing commitment to Patient Centered Care, the PCFHC utilizes a clinical appointment booking system that helps the PCFHC better understand the needs of its patients. Available appointments are distributed throughout each provider's daily schedule based on supply and demand, allowing our patients to see their health care provider without delay as every effort is made to provide appointments within 24 hours of the initial request. The utilization of Advanced Access has resulted in improved patient access to care, office efficiency and patient flow, as well as an increase in patient satisfaction.

The PCFHC continues to offer a number of programs and services for both patients of the Family Health Centre and the general public such as: • Well Baby Program – New babies are offered a non rostered spot with one of our Nurse Practitioners.

SECURITY AND FIRE ALARMS

FALSE ALARMS BY-LAWS 549/09 AND 590/09

Every year a significant portion of the Police and Fire budgets are spent responding to false alarms at business and residential locations.

When an alarm activation occurs and the alarm companies cannot get ahold of a key holder or person responsible for the building in which the alarm is located, the police or fire department is always dispatched. This pulls the police (usually two cars) from their designated patrol area or fire department personnel from their homes (volunteer department). Once the alarm has been checked and it has been determined that no criminal act or actual fire has occurred, or the respondents have been stood down prior to their arrival, then it is determined who is responsible for the false alarm. Usually this is the building occupant or homeowner.

If the alarm is the result of a false alarm, then the Town would act as the administrator of the by-law and would provide information services as follows: 1. First alarm results in no action by the town;

2. Second alarm results in a letter being sent advising the occupant or homeowner of the first and second alarms, the details of the by-law and a warning that future false alarms will result in service fees being invoiced; and

3. Third and subsequent

alarms will result in service fees in the amount of \$300.00 per false alarm being levied against the occupant or homeowner.

In addition, any invoices not paid in accordance with the by-law shall be added to the property tax levy.

The only time a letter or

an invoice would be sent is when the police or fire department have declared the alarm to be a false alarm. This would include any activations caused by improper opening/closing procedures, faulty installation, improper sensitivity settings, lack of maintenance to the system or to the locations where sensors have been mounted (spider webs, windows and doors loosen, drafts or water leakage).

To avoid any problems, ensure that the alarm points and units are serviced on a regular basis, kept clean and occupants of the building are aware of the alarms and procedures.

Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week



The week of November 1st 2014 has been designated as Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week. Designating the calendar week beginning on November 1 as Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week aligns the need to check carbon monoxide detectors and appliances with the end of daylight savings time. Changing the time on clocks and maintaining safety alarms are two necessary tasks that are easy to perform and promote together.

Carbon monoxide is known as the silent killer because it is a colourless, odourless and tasteless gas.

Reminding Ontarians of the importance of having functioning carbon monoxide detectors can help save lives. As winter approaches, the impetus to begin using gas fired appliances, such as fireplaces, that can produce lethal carbon monoxide increases. Appliances that are rarely used over the summer months may develop leaks or blockages and cause carbon monoxide to accumulate inside the home. Therefore, it is important to inspect appliances and carbon monoxide detectors when the colder temperatures begin. What is the source of carbon monoxide?

Carbon monoxide (CO) is produced by the incomplete combustion of fuels such as natural gas, propane, heating oil, kerosene, coal, charcoal, gasoline and wood. This problem can occur in any device which depends on burning for heat or energy. For example, furnaces, boilers, room heaters, hot water heaters, stoves, grills and any internal combustion engine are included in this list of devices. **What makes carbon monoxide so dangerous?**

Carbon monoxide is an odorless, colourless gas which is extremely toxic. When carbon monoxide is inhaled, it produces an effect known as chemical asphyxiation. Injury is due to the combining of CO with hemoglobin in the blood, lowering the blood's oxygencarrying capacity. Even at very low parts per million levels, the body is quickly affected by oxygen starvation. Exposure during sleep is particularly dangerous because the victim usually does not awaken. **Plan your escape**

Make sure that everyone knows the sound of the smoke alarm and the carbon monoxide alarm and what to do if the alarms are activated. Create an escape plan with the entire household and practice it. Make sure your plan identifies two ways out of each room, if possible, and a meeting place outside. Once outside, stay outside. Never re-enter a burning building or a building filled with carbon monoxide. Call the fire department from a neighbour's home or cell phone.

Municipal partners in the Ottawa Valley Waste Recovery Centre (OVWRC). In 2013, residents and businesses, through the curbside collection program, sent 2,512 tonnes of garbage, 1,399 tonnes of recyclables and 2,125 tonnes of organics to the OVWRC for processing.

Tom Mohns, Town of Petawawa Deputy Mayor and Vice-Chair of the Ottawa Valley Waste Management Board is pleased to see the Community is doing its part to "Walk Lightly on the Environment," but knows there is always room for improvement. "Our Community has residents from all parts of the world who have participated in a wide range of waste management programs. It's important that residents know what is accepted in Petawawa's program. Sorting waste properly makes the overall system more cost effective and efficient."

The Ottawa Valley Waste Recovery Centre produces an annual collection calendar that outlines everything you need to know about curbside collection. Schedules were mailed out

to residents in March. Copies are also available at the Town of Petawawa Municipal Office, online at www.ovwrc.com and at various locations throughout the community such as CFHA.

Here are a few other reminders about the local waste management program:

• Styrofoam: Effective April 1st, ONLY White Styrofoam is accepted in recycling. Due to changes in end market specifications only WHITE Styrofoam plates, cups, bowls, takeout containers, rigid packaging and egg cartons are accepted in the yellow bin. Remove all tape, plastic wrap, absorbent pads (discard with garbage) and food. Coloured Styrofoam (i.e. yellow meat tray), Styrofoam insulation, and packing peanuts are regular garbage.

• Recycle Right!: Not everything is recyclable. Review the sorting guide included in your collection schedule to determine where an item should be disposed of. For example, plastic flower pots and trays are not acceptable for recycling - they must be placed in regular garbage.

• Bulky Item Collection: Check your Collection Schedule for your Bulky Item Collection in May. This is for curbside pick-up of large items such as furniture and appliances. Construction and renovation material, including toilets, as well as hazardous and electronic waste and tires ARE NOT accepted for curbside collection.

• Ottawa Valley Waste Recovery Centre: Material not accepted as bulky item collection may be brought to the Waste Recovery Centre for disposal (applicable disposal fees apply). We are located in Laurentian Valley at 900 Woito Station Road (accessible from B-Line Road or Doran Road). To save time and money during your visit to OVWRC ensure your load is separated properly. Keep all recyclables, scrap metal, construction/renovation waste, hazardous and electronic waste, and tires separate in your load so it's easier to deposit them in the different locations at OVWRC. The Centre (including the Hazardous and Electronic Waste Depot) is open Monday to Friday, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Visit www.

By-law Enforcement & Animal Control Officer It has been detailed in previous newspapers that Town Council has officially ratified the existence of an off leash dog park in Petawawa located on the grounds of the Petawawa Civic Centre property in an area known as the "Back 40". The park will be open to anyone who has purchased access to the park and will fall under operational control of a committee reporting to the Parks & Recreation Department. The committee has been formed from four stakeholders and four community residents with a mandate to operate and develop the park for the betterment of the community.

As part of the committee's work, a name for the park, rules of usage and costs have been discussed and agreed upon. The official name of the park is "PETAWAWA SCEN-TRAL BARK". The rules of the park will be provided for all users and will be posted at the park site. Use of the park will be restricted to those dog owners who have purchased a yearly access tag (\$20.00). Yearly tags will run from April 1st to March 31st of the following year regardless of when purchased and must be with the dog when at the park. The tags will be available through the Town of Petawawa main office or through the Parks and Recreation Department at the Civic Centre. Garrison Petawawa dogs and dogs from other municipalities are welcome to participate.

The park will undergo changes in the coming months, beginning with a permanent fence being put in place, repositioning of the existing access gate, establishment of a small dog enclosure (for those who don't like big dogs) and some landscaping. Many of these initiatives will be ongoing and other ideas will be added as we progress.

Microburst 2013 – Municipal Emergency Preparedness and Response

Friday July 19, 2013 saw a significant storm event travel through the Town of Petawawa. Environment Canada had reported that a cold front was rapidly moving through the area, triggering vicious storms and much of eastern Ontario including the Town of Petawawa was under a tornado watch. At 1:30 pm the summer storm which included high winds and heavy rains swept through the area and within 15 minutes created a path of destruction. Downed trees and fences, widespread power outages and significant damages to numerous residential and commercial buildings was the result.

This event garnered interest from outside agencies and various news outlets, including CTV News, CBC News, various radio stations as well as our local paper contacted the Town for statements and requested interviews with our Mayor. The Community Emergency Management Coordinator provided updates to Emergency Management Ontario and the Town was also contacted by the Red Cross as well as the Salvation Army with offers of assistance. Representatives from Environment Canada toured the Town the following day and Meteorologist Peter Kimball confirmed through his investigation that the storm event was in fact a microburst and not a tornado.

The community response was remarkable with neighbours helping neighbours. Town staff immediately rose to the occasion with the Public Works Department, Town Fire Department and the Parks and Recreation staff all working together. In some cases, staff created detours, provided traffic control, removed downed trees all working in a coordinated effort that stemmed from the Town's Emergency Response Plan.

Quick decisions were made by management to provide curb side collection of waste wood for those people unable to transport the material to the Civic Centre property. The material gathered at the Civic Centre was eventually shredded and later sold to a contractor. The Public Works Department worked with the County of Renfrew whose Forestry Department completed an assessment of the damage to Town property. A report was prepared on how best to proceed with the clean-up. Because of the extent of the damages many parks and municipal lands were closed and their clean-up was left to an external contractor who was hired through a tender process. This contract was completed in December after which the parks were reopened. The cost to the Municipality for the complete clean-up

was in the order of \$230,000.00.

The Town of Petawawa is observing changing weather and climate patterns including stronger winds, longer periods without rain (drought) as well as intense rainfalls. Climatic changes are being seen around the globe and as such staff must ensure that they are informed on weather issues so that they may coordinate with other Municipalities on best practices when dealing with weather related issues. Staff are also involved in receiving updates from various agencies such as the Climate Change Adaptation Community of Practice.

The Emergency Response Plan created by the Town of Petawawa is reviewed on an annual basis and emergency exercises are also conducted on an annual basis to ensure compliance with the Emergency Management



provide staff with the opportunity to train and practice their roles as well as allow them to work with equipment and procedures that would be implemented if we were involved in a declared disaster. Residents of the Town are reminded that you too play a role in keeping our community safe. Individuals and families should be prepared to take care of themselves for a minimum of 72 hours in the event of an emergency. Ensuring Community & Neighbourhood quality through Property Standards

As you travel around town you will notice a substantial increase in the commercial and residential developments. With these developments, brings additional emphasis in the area of Property Standards concerns. As you know, the reason for Property Standards By-Law #146/2000 is to better educate and allow you, the homeowner, the opportunity to help ensure quality neighbourhood and community standards. These standards are to assist in creating a safer and cleaner community to reside in as well as to ensure that all properties are maintained to specific standards within our town.

The Town's Property Standards Bylaw (146/2000) will help property owners understand their responsibilities as residents and will also assist in avoiding consequences for violation of this Bylaw. The most common Property Standards issue is yards. By-Law 146/2000, section 2.01 (b) states that, "every owner shall ensure his property is maintained in accordance with the provisions of this By-law..." Further information on the By-law can be accessed on our website at www.petawawa.ca.

Currently, the Town is implementing a new complaint process that will ensure follow-up and accountability to residents, when being addressed. If you are concerned about a local property that may be in violation of the Property Standards By-law, a formal complaint can be filed at the Town Office. Once a complaint is received it is forwarded to the CAO and dependent

on the nature of the complaint, it will then be assigned to the appropriate department for investigation/follow-up. Please note that anonymous complaints are NOT accepted as in rare instances court action may be required, and if this occurs, the complaint documentation cannot be utilized without being signed and dated by the complainant.

PETAWAWA Thank You From Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic School

Way back in March of 2013, Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic School began an adventure which took it within reach of winning an outdoor classroom worth \$20,000. The Petawawa school had been selected as a finalist in the Canada-wide Trees of Knowledge competition, which was sponsored by Majesta, the maker of paper towels and tissue, "to generate inspiring, creative ideas where students can learn outside the traditional classroom." Other sponsors were the Ontario Forestry Association's Focus on Forests and Tree Canada, which promotes environmental stewardship and forestry education. Students and staff were hard at work on a publicity campaign to gain support through its online voting platform, and the community really rallied behind its children!

10 schools in Canada for the competition, Our Lady of Sorrows submitted a plan to beautify all aspects of its school yard to make it an "outdoor classroom," including log benches, flower beds, a community garden, and a variety of native plants and trees. Lastly, a plan was set to build an 800 square foot open-air log cabin, for the purpose of taking the learning outside and letting students 'get their hands dirty' through taking part in classes in the great outdoors. The proposal, which was spearheaded by Grade 6 teacher Mark Sokolski, also described how the outdoor classroom would be used and maintained. Principal Christina Brown said the proposal included jobs for students in each grade to care for the outdoor classroom, "such as Grade 1 students planting seeds, and the Grade 6 class weeding and raking."

To earn a place in the top

weeding and raking." e top The students took their ideas to the public. Students set up online voting stations and displayed posters in prominent locations. Weekly street rallies helped generate interest. Much of Petawawa Boulevard saw its street signs lending support to get the word out. Students spoke to Town Council, filmed promotional videos, and prepared public service announcements on several radio stations. The Town of Petawawa quickly started to warm to the idea. Facebook campaigns went viral. The campaign found partners in the online community, including several musicians, authors, and NHL players. The Ottawa Senators organization began using twitter to promote the contest and gain voter support online. The twitter campaign from Our Lady of Sorrows School had crossed 500,000 tweets! Dozens of local partners stepped forward to donate equipment as well as their financial sup-

port to the project.

During the month long voting process, Our Lady of Sorrows led twice, but were

overtaken by a school from New Brunswick in the final week. Despite a massive push to try to overcome the deficit, the school was thrilled with the second place finish! In fact, the outdoor education area in Petawawa was completed before the winning school had even broken ground at their site. This is all in great part due to the tremendous support of the community in Petawawa. Our students learned the value of hard work, but also completed their vision with a grand sense of appreciation about the incredible community in which they live. Petawawa is simply an amazing place! We are so blessed to be here... it was amazing how, no matter where the students went, or what doors they knocked on for help, they were never turned away, and always left with some kind of support for the project.

Among those who made the project possible were the men of 2 Combat Engineering Regiment out of Garrison Petawawa, overseen by Sgt Todd Reilly and Master Cpl Rick Stanutz, who excavated the site, poured the foundations, built the roof and put on the shingles; (A mature red oak tree has been planted in their honour!) Dan Albert of Coyote Log Homes; Tree Canada, Staples Advantage and TD Friends of the Environment Foundation which allowed them to buy all of the trees and shrubs; the Renfrew County Catholic District School Board; Our Lady of Sorrows school council; the Town of Petawawa; Shaw Lumber and Home Depot for donating the materials, with Allan Campbell of Home Depot installing the eavestroughs himself; the H and H Construction crew; Kathy Godin and Home Hardware staff.

Others who contributed include: Glen MacGillivray, CH Concrete, Clouthier Logging, The Pronto Food Mart, Hubert's Nursery, Mulvihill Drug Mart, the Petawawa Catholic Women's League, M and J Enterprises, Dale and Tony Donnelly, Sylvia Neville of Neville Motors, the Petawawa Horticultural Society, Moncion Grocers and the Petawawa Market, Rexall Pharma Plus and the TD Bank Group.

While the project started as a contest entry, it ended up being a widescale community achievement. As the colder weather passes, students will begin taking their learning outdoors again. The flowers and trees which volunteers planted in the fall will come to bloom, bringing much life to the schoolyard which once stood quite vast and empty. The school still has plans to add some larger trees, and is looking for sponsors who would like to adopt a tree during the spring plant. There are plans to add in rainwater collection systems, a vegetable patch, and to invite guest speakers for both student and community benefit.

On March 21, 2013, Darlene Travis posted on the Town of Petawawa facebook page: We are up against some pretty big cities so let's show them what a small town can do when we all work together.

A huge thank you to all of Petawawa for the wonderful and generous support which was shown!

The Ottawa Valley's newest school opens in Petawawa September 2014

Valour School will bring 21st Century education and a state-of-the-art facility to the community of Petawawa when the Kindergarten to Grade 12 school officially opens its doors September 2014. The brand new building, currently under construction on Leeder Lane off of Civic Centre Road, will be a two-storey, 126,000 square-foot facility capable of housing 1,460 students.

"The result will be an amazing, dual stream English and French Immersion, state-of-the-art school which will meet our students' learning needs well into the future," Valour School Principal Bryan Baird said.

Valour School will include junior

and senior Kindergarten classrooms (housed in its own wing), elementary classrooms, secondary academic and specialty classrooms, a café, a huge gymnasium capable of being divided into four separate rooms and boasting the highest ceilings in Renfrew County, a media centre, dual stream English and French Immersion, High Performance Sports programming, full wireless connectivity and wiring for SMARTboard technology in all classrooms. Valour School will also house brand-new automotive, construction and robotics technology rooms, a theatre arts, music and visual arts room and a fully equipped fitness centre.

There will be one wireless device for every three Valour School students including 60 iPad minis in the junior and senior Kindergarten program to support literacy and numeracy learning. Kindergarten students will have their own selfcontained play yard equipped to support outdoor experiential learning.

The school, designed by Barry J. Hobin Architects, is the model of efficiency. It will use 50 per cent less natural gas than the three schools the new school is replacing (Pinecrest and General Lake Public Schools and General Panet High School) saving the Renfrew County District School Board roughly \$40,000 a year. Valour School will be 50 per cent more efficient than the Model National Energy Code for Buildings requires.

Valour School will be more than just a home for Petawawa's students, it will also be an invaluable community hub. The café, media centre and quad gym will be centrally located to facilitate ease of use by the Petawawa community during off-school hours. Valour School will be the Renfrew County District School Board's first brand new facility since Arnprior's A. J. Charbonneau Public School opened in 1997.
