Municipal Election October 22, 2018

Voting Day is on Monday, October 22, 2018. This is the day that Petawawa residents will elect their Mayor and Councillors.

We encourage you to participate in the municipal election process as voting is a fundamental right of our democracy and you are also ensuring your support for those candidates who share your vision for your community and who will be representing your interests for the next four years. For this election the Town of Petawawa will be using the alternative voting methods of **Internet** and Telephone. It is very important that our Voters' List be as accurate as possible to ensure that all eligible voters receive their Voter Information Letter which contains a unique Voter ID and PIN # to vote electronically. Residents will be able to vote electronically anytime during the Voting Period (10:00 a.m. on Friday, October 12, 2018 until 8:00 p.m. on Monday, October 22, 2018). The Voter Information Letter is scheduled to be delivered the first week of October. If you do not receive your Voter Information Letter in the mail by Tuesday, October 9, 2018, please contact the municipal office.

Residents not wishing to vote electronically will be able to cast a paper ballot on Advance Voting Day (Saturday, October 13, 2018, 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.) and on Voting Day (Monday, October 22, 2018, 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.) at the Town of Petawawa Municipal Office, 1111 Victoria Street.

Voters should ensure that their names and relevant information are correctly shown on the Voters' List. Not sure if you're on the Voters' List? Call 613-687-5536 and speak with the Returning Officer or designate or you can also attend the municipal office in person, Monday to Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. to have your name added to the Voters' List.

WHO MAY VOTE?

Any person who on Voting Day meets the following qualifications is eligible to vote:

- Is a Canadian Citizen;
- Is at least 18 years old on Voting Day;
 - Resides in the municipality or is the owner, tenant, or spouse of the owner or tenant of land; (this includes residents who live on the north and south side of Garrison Petawawa)
- Any person not prohibited, by law, from voting.

Available with most major banks - search "Petawawa" to locate account name - use your 19 digit roll number as your account number starting with 4779 without any decimals or spaces.

By Mail - Cheques made payable to "Town of Petawawa" can be mailed to 1111 Victoria Street, Petawawa, ON K8H 2E6, Be sure to include the instalment stub with your payment to ensure proper credit to your account(s).

In Person - The Municipal Office is located at 1111 Victoria Street, Petawawa and it is open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday, except statutory holidays. Payment can be made by cash, cheque or Interac.

At a Bank or Financial Institution -

Contact your financial institution for further information - bank service charges may apply.



Reminders from the Fire Department

~Change your Clock - Change your Batteries~

- A smoke alarm is required on every storey & outside all sleeping areas in your house. Smoke alarms more than ten (10) years old, should be replaced.
- Carbon Monoxide (CO) is known as the silent killer colourless, tasteless and odourless gas. If your home has a fuel-burning appliance, ensure CO detectors are adjacent to all sleeping areas. Replace every seven (7) years.

Smoke & Carbon Monoxide alarms are required by law.

BURNING – By-law 1196/18

Recreational Fires - Requires approval by the Chief Fire Official or designate. Site visits will be conducted - CO and smoke alarms will be tested to ensure that they are functional prior to the issuing of the permit. To apply or renew your annual recreational fire permit please contact the municipal office.

Rural Burning - No persons shall set a fire or allow a fire to burn within the boundaries of the Town of Petawawa without first having obtained a permit from the Municipality or the Chief Fire Official. Rural fires are only permitted in areas with a minimum property size of three (3) acres or 1.2 hectares. Rural burning is not allowed from May 1 to September 30 inclusive.

Zero Tolerance will be enforced for those who burn without a permit. Charges will be laid.



PARKING - By-law 257/03

While some Town roads have specific parking and stopping regulations posted on signs, there are some regulations that are applied town-wide and are listed as follows:

Unless otherwise posted, parking is not permitted:

- ✓ within 1.5 m of an entrance to a driveway
- ✓ within 3 m of a fire hydrant
- ✓ within 10 m of an intersection
- ✓ more than 15 cm from a curb

Parking is not permitted in the following locations:

- ✓ on or overhanging a sidewalk or curb
- ✓ in a manner obstructing traffic
- ✓ facing the wrong direction on a roadway.
- ✓ on private property without the property owner's consent
- ✓ on municipal property without authorization

Winter Parking Restrictions

(November 15 to March 31):

- ✓ no parking on any street from 1:00 am to 7:00 am
- ✓ at any time when accumulated snow fall exceeds or is expected to exceed 5 cm
- ✓ during any snow removal or clearing operation

Family Health Centre

The Petawawa Centennial Family Health Centre (PCFHC) serves approximately 7700 patients and has clinical and support staff of 32 people. The PCFCH operates with the mission: "to provide a broad range of primary health care and health promotion services to protect, preserve and promote the health and well-being of all residents of the Town of Petawawa and area."

In partnership with many local hospitals and Health Service agencies the PCFHC offers ongoing programs and clinics which consist of:

- Smoking Cessation;
- Well Women's Clinic (for those women who do NOT have a family physician);
- Well Baby Clinic;
- Breast Feeding Clinic;
- Mindfulness for Stress Reduction;
- Monthly Nutrition sessions;
- Falls Prevention Program;
- Valour High School Program; and
- Cooking with Kids in the Class.

We continue to support education and training through school co-op placements and allied health professional training (Dietitian, Registered Nurse, Nurse Practitioner and Medical student placements); an integral part of our "giving back" to the community philosophy.

Help Prevent Landfill Fires

Did you know that rechargeable, lithium-ion batteries found in electronic devices such as tablets, cellphones and laptops are highly flammable? When these batteries are punctured, the liquid contents of the battery react with water in the air, generating high heat and sometimes producing a fire.

This happens at the landfill. People are throwing their old laptops and tablets in the garbage. Our landfill equipment compacts the garbage, crushing the electronic devices and their batteries, resulting in small landfill fires. Luckily, our fast acting staff, have been able to quickly extinguish these fires.

Fires in or around the landfill are of particular concern as they have the potential to emit dangerous fumes and can burn, if undetected, for extended periods of time.

Proper disposal of waste electronics is easy, convenient and drop-off is free. Residents of Petawawa have many options:

- The Ottawa Valley Waste Recovery Centre's Electronic Waste Depot open year round at 900 Woito Station Road (Enter at Gate 3)
- Curbside pick-up during the Spring and Fall Large Item Collection
- Drop-off at the Centre's Environmental Days (Always held in May at the Petawawa Civic Centre)
- Many community drop-off locations and/or events (i.e. schools, community organization fundraisers, etc.)

PETAWAWA SALUTES ITS VETERANS

When you visit the Garrison Military Museum make sure you check out the display on Private Samuel Henry Brown, born 1891. He served in the 4th Canadian Machine Gun Company, 2nd Division for the Canadian Expeditionary Force. On April 9th, 1917 he was part of the attack on Vimy Ridge. In August his company was part of the assault on Hill 70 where he sustained several gunshot wounds to which he succumbed on August 20th. His nephew served from 1949-1954 at Base Petawawa with the Royal Canadian Dragoons.
