What a busy spring and summer full of projects, events, and camps!

The Civic Centre grounds saw lighting upgrades to the arena, a new accessible play piece donated by the Greater Petawawa Civitan and Petawawa Rotary Clubs in the Civitan Playland and upgraded bleachers and mini putt greens thanks to donations from the Petawawa Civic Centre Fundraising Committee, to name a handful of projects.

Civic Centre Days, expanded across the Town with a well attended screening of Jaws at Petawawa Point, a Trail Run event, and the best attended Craft Beer Festival to date. The Water and Dirt Festival grew too, adding new partners, sponsors, and is now up to 15 events. Summer camps increased enrollment this year and sold out in record time. The CNL Science, Paddle and Adventure Camps continue to be extremely popular.

Now with the fall upon us, the leaves are changing, cooler temperatures are approaching, so it's time to grab a cozy sweater and hiking boots to explore the trails. Council and staff have been working diligently to ensure that the fall and winter of 2023 will be an exciting season in Petawawa and spring of 2024 will once again have some amazing events planned. Petawawa's winter carnival, Cabin Fever, will be a highlight of the new year along with our regular winter programming and outdoor activities. Our night time Santa Claus parade will continue as well as our new Christmas market, and an exciting new festive addition to our celebration will be a Christmas Trail of Lights.

Randa Teschner was born and raised right here in Petawawa. As a young girl, Randa was a natural all-around athlete and took a keen interest in downhill ski racing. She learned how to ski at Mount Molson and started to excel at the local, regional, and national level. Through hard work and determination, her passion for skiing allowed her to travel the world, training and racing all throughout Europe, Chile, Australia, New Zealand and North America. She competed for Team Canada at the World Junior Championships in 2012.

Randa proceeded to race on the NCAA circuit for the University of New Hampshire, graduating as a three time All-American, with a Bachelor's of Kinesiology in Athletic Training. For four years Randa coached all over the world and was living in Italy when the pandemic hit and that's when everything changed.

Randa moved back to Petawawa during the pandemic, and it was the longest she'd spent at home, not travelling since she was 12. Her priorities shifted and she decided to pursue a childhood dream that she had long forgot about, being a musician. Randa grew up playing piano and juggled lessons all throughout her skiing career. 



Petawawa Salutes Its Veterans

Sgt. Bill Humphries, CD, Korea Medal, UN Service Medal for Korea

The Korean War was one of the most significant chapters in our country's proud military history. More than 26,000 brave Canadians served on land, at sea and in the air during this bitter conflict that raged in from 1950 to 1953. The Soviet Union deployed troops into the northern portion of the newly liberated Korean peninsula while American soldiers moved into the southern half.

A boundary was established between these two zones along the 38th Parallel of latitude. The Soviets and the Americans withdrew their forces within a few years, but not before a communist government had been established in the north and a democratic government in the south. Tensions between the two sides grew, climaxing on June 25, 1950, when North Korean troops invaded South Korea. This set off more than three years of fighting in the place traditionally known to its people as the "Land of the Morning Calm."

Bill Humphries was born in Guelph, Ontario on January 14th, 1933 and joined the 11th Field Regiment Royal Canadian Artillery reserve unit in Guelph as a teenager. In 1951, Bill decided to enlist and travelled to London, Ontario to join as a motorcycle dispatch rider for a signals squadron. Bill completed eight weeks of basic training in Kingston and an additional three months of motorcycle dispatch rider training. Over the course of the 1951-52 winter, Bill completed his driver signals training in all forms of vehicles.

In the summer of 1952, he was one of six recruits chosen to form the Canadian Military Dispatch Rider Display Team to travel Canada and perform. But before he could begin, Bill was asked if he would volunteer to go to the Korean War, and at the age of 19, he accepted. Bill was attached to the 25th Canadian Infantry Brigade Group and travelled from Guelph to Vancouver by train. Bill shipped out from Seattle on the USS General Hugh J. Gaffey and landed in Yokohama, Japan in June of 1952. After 21 days of mountain battle training in Japan, Bill sailed to Pusan (Busan) South Korea and by late summer he was stationed near the town of Uijeongbu at the rear brigade headquarters.

Throughout his time in Korea, Bill was tasked regularly with special dispatch rider runs between rear brigade and main headquarters close to the front lines. The motorcycles and jeeps carried sensitive messages that couldn't be transmitted over the radio lest the enemy intercept them. Messages were sent day and night, with the night messages being carried in blackout conditions. In July of 1953, Bill left South Korea from Inchon to Japan by boat, then a flight from Tokyo to Vancouver and a train to Guelph. Upon his return to Canada, Bill was posted to Borden to be a driver for the Base Commander and in September of 1954 he married Millie, they will celebrate their 70th anniversary next year.

In 1954, Bill was posted to Soest, West Germany and then spent time at bases in Kingston, Vernon and one year in Egypt in 1957-58 as part of the peacekeeping force for the Suez Canal Crisis. He was eventually posted to Petawawa in 1964 where he worked with 2 Signals Squadron and the 8th Canadian Hussars until his retirement in 1976 as a Sergeant.

Bill remained in Petawawa and worked as a civilian with the Base Construction Engineers in various shops until his retirement in 1993.

The courageous Canadian men and women who served in the Korean War put their lives on the line, traveling to the other side of the world to help UN forces trying to restore peace. It was dangerous duty in a harsh land far different than their own and 516 Canadians lost their lives in service during the conflict. Petawawa wishes to salute Sgt. Bill Humphries for his service in the Canadian military during the Korean War, his UN peacekeeping mission in Egypt and his entire 25 year career in the Canadian Armed Forces.

SNOW SAFETY TIPS

FOR CHILDREN, A SNOWBANK IS A PLAYGROUND! HOWEVER, CHILDREN NEED TO BE TAUGHT TO TAKE CARE. TWO BIG RISKS FROM WINTER SNOW PLAY FOR CHILDREN ARE SUFFOCATION IN SNOW DRIFTS AND ACCIDENTS INVOLVING SNOW REMOVAL EQUIPMENT.

Snow Forts

A child can suffocate if they are trapped in a snow structure. According to Child Safety Link, at least one Canadian child dies this way every year. In 2021, a 12-year-old Toronto boy who was buried under snow was rushed to hospital and survived his injuries.

In 2014, a 9-year-old boy in Orangeville died after his snow bank snow fort collapsed. These tragic events demonstrate the importance of teaching children not to build forts with roofs, and not to tunnel into snowbanks.



Snow Clearing Equipment

Winter snow operations involve heavy machinery such as snowplows, sidewalk plows, and large snowblowers. Children should never play in or on snowbanks that border roads because snowplow operators and other drivers may not see them.



Children should also keep well away from snowblowers, both the machine and the snow it spits. Snow removal machines cut into snowbanks to widen the road when snow is accumulating, which is another reason to make sure that children do not build snow forts in snowbanks.

Parents should be sure to actively supervise young children who are playing outside. Older children can keep safe with the buddy system.

WINTER PARKING RESTRICTIONS

BY-LAW 257/2003

As per the by-law no person shall park on any roadway within the municipality from:

1:00AM TO 7:00AM FROM NOVEMBER 15TH TO MARCH 31ST

Don't park on the street during a snowfall – or immediately following a snowfall. Parked cars are obstacles that slow down plowing operations. Your vehicle may also be ticketed or towed.



SURVIVING THE WINTER MONTHS

Be patient. In heavy snowfalls it takes us longer to get all our streets and sidewalks cleared.

Be a good neighbour. Help those who may not be able to shovel their driveways.

Keep garbage cans and recycling bins back in your driveway 5-6 feet from road edge so that plows can efficiently clear roadways. And please keep garbage cans and recycling bins off the sidewalks.

COOKING SAFETY

This year's Fire Prevention Week™ (FPW™) campaign, "Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire prevention™," works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe when cooking.

DID YOU KNOW?

Cooking fires are the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of cooking fires and deaths.

TOP TIPS:

TURN pot handles toward the back of the stove. Always keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner.

WATCH what you heat. Set a timer to remind you that you are cooking.

HAVE a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 metre) around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.





Keep snow and ice 3 feet away from hydrants In an emergency, every second counts

If there is a fire hydrant near your home, do your part to keep it accessible this winter.

- 🌟 Remove any snow & ice from the hydrant
- 🌟 Clear a wide enough perimeter to walk around it (about 3 feet)
- 🌟 Clear a path from the hydrant to the street

Carbon Monoxide Safety



Do you ice fish? If so, make sure your ice-hut or tent is properly ventilated when using a fuel fired heater or stove.

Petawawa Featured Trail





Dog owners and handlers assume all liability, responsibility and associated

risks related to the dog park and are subject to the Ontario Dog Owner's Liability Act, the Town of Petawawa Animal Control By-law and the Parks

and Recreation Areas By-Law. Failure to abide by the rules and regulations may result in loss of privileges or facility users may be fined.

Questions or concerns please call 613-687-5678

- 1. Dogs must be kept on-leash until inside the double-gated area. Once inside, leashes must be removed from the dog and retained by the owner at all times.
- 2. Any dog that is sick, aggressive, requires a muzzle or is in heat (female) is not permitted in the park. Dogs must be removed at the first sign of aggression.
- 3. Poop n' scoop is mandatory. Bags and bins are available throughout the park.
- 4. Park users and dog owners assume all risks related to dog park usage.
- 5. Owners must have a dog park tag for every dog, available from the Community Services office. This is in addition to a current municipal dog tag.
- 6. Puppies under the age of six (6) months old are not permitted in the park.
- 7. Dogs must be under supervision by a responsible person at all times.
- 8. No one owner may be responsible for more than two (2) dogs in the park.
- 9. Use of the dog park is not recommended for children under the age of 16. All children must be supervised by an adult attendant while inside the fenced areas.
- 10. No food of any kind (e.g. dog treats, human food) is permitted in the dog park. Beverages in non-breakable containers are allowed.
- 11. No dog or children's toys are permitted in the park (e.g. balls, Frisbees).
- 12. Please fill in any holes dug by your dog.
- 13. Dog training is not permitted in the park and dog trainers are not permitted to use the dog park to conduct their business.
